FIRE FEVER

Normally one has to worry about this problem in the feed growing months of spring and autumn. SO why bring it up now? It has been an extraordinary year for plant growth, especially crops. They have all taken off and your cattle are in the process of either eating them or they have just finished eating them.



The warm rains that we have been having in January and February have allowed for a large amount of regrowth. It is this regrowth that you should be wary of. The plant most likely to cause photosensitization is rape. The build up of the phototoxins occurs in the morning. Thus it is a great idea to feed the regrowth after midday when the sugar content is high and the phototoxins are low. Feeding them on pasture / hay / sileage prior to putting them on crops is a great advantage.



If the cows show the classic signs of photosensitivity (eg redness and swollen teats, constant tail flicking, seeking shade, kicking milking cups off, rapid drop in milk production) then rapid treatment with anti-histamines and vitamins twelve hours apart will stop it immediately.

So please keep your eyes open if you are feeding crops!
