## **Nutritional Management of Chronic Kidney Disease in Cats**

Once your cat has reached 7 years of age it is more likely to start Chronic Kidney Disease (CKD).

The clinical signs of CKD in our cats include increased thirst / urination, reduced appetite / weight loss, vomiting and lethargy / depression.

When CKD is occurring the cat in unable to excrete the phosphate and so it increases in its system. This high level causes the kidneys to progressively fail.

In addition to medication the most proven general treatment for CKD is feeding a specifically formulated renal diet. These diets are aimed at reducing the amount of phosphate in the diet. When selecting a diet it should be high in protein and low in phosphate. Feeding Omega 3 in addition will potentiate anti inflammatory effects and help with the renal blood flow.

When medicating a cat with CKD it is preferable to use a liquid preparation to avoid the fight of tableting! Medicating your cat at a time that is not feed time will also stop the association of feed time with the trauma of delivering the required meds. We need our CKD cats to eat and we do not want them to be scared of meal times.

There are 4 stages of the renal disease and we are able to advise you as to what stage your cat may be at with regular blood /urine tests. The rate of progression of renal disease varies considerably between cats and appropriate support and treatment can both increase the quality of life of affected cats and also potentially slow down the progression of the disease.
