

Travelling with Pets

Now that it's cold and wet here many lucky people head North. If you like to take your pets on your travels there are some important considerations:

- Make sure your pet is up to date with vaccinations as they will likely meet other pets and have more chances to be exposed to diseases. Also if they need to stay in a boarding facility up to date vaccination certificates will be required.
- Heartworm disease, although not a problem here, is a serious and common problem the further north you travel. It cannot be treated or prevented with regular worm tablets. It is very important that your pet is on heart worm prevention when you travel north.
- Paralysis ticks are another serious life threatening problem that you may encounter on your travels.
 We recommend frontline every two weeks for tick prevention and daily checking for ticks.



- Wherever you travel drop into the local vet clinic to ask them about local diseases or parasites of concern.
- 6 Keep up with regular worming, try to keep their diet stable and take some water from home.
- If your pet is on regular medications make sure you have enough medications for your travels.
 You may need to take a copy of your veterinary records in case of an emergency.
- Make sure you have up to date ID tags with phone numbers, up to date registration and that the contact details on your microchip registration are correct.
- If your pet becomes anxious with travel then we may be able to provide you with some sedatives.
