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

Equine Asthma

Equine asthma is a condition that arises from an inappropriate inflammatory responses in the lungs due to dust and mold exposure. Proper management is crucial for maintaining a horse's health and performance.

Equine asthma is triggered when sensitive horses inhale dust and mould, leading to inflammation and increased mucus production in the lungs. This can result in an overgrowth of normal respiratory bacteria. Antibiotics are not necessary for this bacterial overgrowth, as it resolves once the inflammation is controlled. Overuse of antibiotics can cause

side effects such as diarrhea, loss of appetite and disruption of beneficial gut bacteria. Additionally, antibiotic-resistant bacteria pose risks by potentially spreading between horses and humans and leading to ineffective treatment.



- Avoid Large Round Bales: These often contain higher dust and mould levels.
- Limit Dry Hay Nets: Use alternatives to reduce dust inhalation.
- Feed on Ground Level: This helps to minimise dust from hay.
- Soak or Steam Hay: These methods reduce dust in the feed.
- Use Low Dust Feeds: Opt for feeds that produce minimal dust.
- Remove Horses During Cleaning: Ensure horses are not present during stable cleaning to avoid dust exposure.
- Use Low Dust Bedding: Replace traditional straw with bedding that generates less dust.

Effective management of equine asthma involves reducing environmental triggers and controlling inflammation. Avoiding unnecessary antibiotic use and focusing on proper environmental adjustments are essential for maintaining the respiratory health and overall well-being of horses.

Dental Health

Periodontal disease is the most commonly diagnosed medical problem in small animal and presents a significant welfare concern due to the potential to cause pain. This condition typically initiates with gingivitis triggered by bacterial plaque accumulation. If left untreated, it progresses to periodontitis, a condition characterised by inflammation of the tooth's supportive structures, leading to tissue destruction and attachment loss.

Detecting dental pain in pets can be challenging since they often do not exhibit obvious symptoms. Hence, it's crucial for pet owners to maintain vigilance regarding their pet's oral health. Regular dental cleanings performed by veterinarians under anesthesia, coupled with diligent home care, are essential preventive measures.

Home care strategies for pets can be either active or passive. Active care involves daily tooth brushing which is the most effective method for plaque removal. Passive care options require less effort and include feeding special dental diets,

Special dental diets such as Hills Science Diet T/D are highly effective, particularly when used as the primary food source. Mixing a portion of this diet with regular pet food can also improve dental health. Additionally, raw bones and quality dental chews are effective in reducing tartar buildup and promoting oral hygiene.
